GREETINGS FROM THE CLAN CHIEF

Sir Murray Pringle of that Ilk and Stichill Bt Chief of the Name and Arms of the Honourable Clan Pringle

A clan is a family, and it is in this spirit I greet all Pringles. Many thanks to our retiring Chairman James and a warm welcome to our new Chairman Derek and the new Trustees Gary, Dave, and Adam. I invite Pringles to join the Clan Pringle Association and hope that more will do so. The more members we have the more we can promote the CPA's aims, in particular, the aspirations encouraging fellowship and the study of our unique genealogy. We



would also appreciate help in the selection and promotion of our projects. The CPA website is a wonderful resource to make a start on all things Pringle.

The Role of Clan Chief and the Jacobite Uprisings

Sir Murray has also provided this article on the historical role of Clan Chief, the Jacobite Risings and how they changed that role and the traditional Clan system in Scotland.

Traditionally, the principal functions of the Chief, who once exerted considerable authority, were to lead the Clan in battle, to manage communal land distribution, settle disputes and generally promote social harmony.

"According to former Lord Lyon Sir Thomas Innes of Learney, a clan is a community that is distinguished by heraldry and recognised by the sovereign. Without that recognition, a clan chief, and therefore the clan, would have no official recognition. Innes further considered clans to be a "noble incorporation" because the arms borne by a clan chief with supporters are granted or otherwise recognised by the Lord Lyon as an officer of the Crown, thus conferring royal recognition." (*Recognition of Chiefs in Scots Law, Wikipedia*). However little authority remains today.

The first Jacobite rebellion of 1688 sought to replace Mary and William of Orange with **James Francis Edward Stuart son** of James VII, heir to the throne of Great Britain, some four months after Catholic James VII was deposed. The Jacobite army, comprised mostly of Scottish Highlanders, took control of the town of Perth.

The second Jacobite rebellion was the result of poor living conditions between 1690 to 1715 brought about by inclement weather leading to failed harvests, high taxation and poor economic growth in Scotland. Anne died in 1714 without living issue, and the crown passed to a foreign king, George I, a second cousin.

The third Jacobite Rebellion from 1716 to 1719 was assisted by Philip V of Spain in an attempt to reclaim territory lost during the War of Spanish Succession. Some 5,000 Spanish soldiers sailed to fight for James, "but the fleet was devastated by a storm in the Bay of Biscay". About 1,000 survivors were defeated by English forces at the Battle of Glenshiel.

"James returned to Italy to marry Maria Clementina Sobieska, a wealthy Polish princess. On December 31, 1720, Maria gave birth to Charles Edward Stuart, Bonnie prince Charlie, the Young Pretender." (*Thought Co*).

The final 1745 Jacobite Rising was when Bonnie Prince Charlie, disappointed at French unwillingness to invade in 1744, decided to finance his own rising. Initially it was success, once again drawing most of its support from the north-east and the Highland

clans. The Jacobite army captured Edinburgh in September and advanced as far south as Derby in England. However, with no sign of French support, the army retreated to their stronghold in the Highlands and was finally defeated at Culloden Moor near Inverness in 1746.

"A few months after the defeat at Culloden, Charles fled the country disguised as a woman. He died in Rome in 1788." (*Thought Co*).

The consequences of the Jacobite 1745 rebellion were swift. The Heritable Jurisdictions Act 1746 and the Act of Proscription 1746 sought to crush the clan system and feudal relationships. Kilts, tartans, bagpipes, weapons, and the Gaelic language were banned, and the penalties were severe.

To ensure another rising would never occur, the Duke of Cumberland dispatched soldiers across the Highlands to find, imprison, and execute any suspected Jacobites. "The Hanoverian government implemented a system of forfeiture, confiscating private lands of suspected Jacobites and repurposing them for agriculture. This system, which became known as the Highland Clearances, lasted for nearly a century." (*Thought Co*).

In this situation I believe my own Stichill family were reluctant to make our clan connections too obvious, but, nevertheless, they used a combined Stitchill and Chief's arms in the 19th century.

A relative of the Stichill Pringles, Sir Walter Scott of Abbotsford, through his writings, and Queen Victoria through her support of all things Scottish, glamorised the clan system in Scotland. There has been a revival of the clan system albeit in a very different form as exemplified by our own Clan Pringle Association.

Agnes Pringle 1853-1934 A Famous Pringle Artist



Agnes Pringle was born in Gateshead in Tyne and Wear, in north east England, just south of the Scottish border. She was the daughter of a shipping agent.

Not very much is known about her personal life other than the fact Agnes was a gifted artist. She first attended the Newcastle School of Art. Agnes studied under William Cosens Way for a time. Then, she went on to the Royal Academy Schools. There she won gold medals for "best drawing of an antique", and "best drawing" of a statue.

Agnes created many beautiful paintings such as the painting here.

Agnes also provided the illustrations for a children's book, Little Loves by Walter Hodgson. It was published in 1890 by Raphael Tuck and also in 1910.

Agnes Pringle passed away in 1934 in Brentford, Middlesex.

We can still visit Agnes's beautiful artwork. Her paintings are on display in the Chiswick Town Hall, Hammersmith Ar-

chives and with the Artists of the Northern Counties exhibition at Newcastle's Laing Art Gallery.

- Appreciation was extended to James M Pringle for his work on the CPA website. Requests were made that an online system for CPA membership be set up along with an online link to leave messages, suggestions and ideas for the Board of Trustees.
- The Annual International Day of Friendship is on July 30. There was brief discussions about how members might reach out and contact other Pringles on this date in honor of the Pringle motto "Friendship gives Honors".
- Questions were raised about the International Gathering of Pringles in 2025. James W of Torwoodlee asked that an organizing committee be established for this event. He offered to be the "man on the ground" locally to assist in the venture.

I was honored to be elected as a Trustee of the Clan Pringle Association at the Annual General Meeting on June 25. I have been involved with Clan Pringle North America since 2016 when I attended the first gathering of North American Pringles in New Haven, Connecticut. I assisted as a member of the Clan Pringle North America



Steering Committee, in organizing the three subsequent gatherings in 2018 (Niagara Falls), 2020 (Virtual) and 2022 (Virtual). I am a recently retired professional geologist, was born in Victoria, British Columbia. My grandfather William Pringle hails from Melrose, Scotland and moved to Canada after World War 1 and worked as a gardener for the City of Calgary. My father, Norman Ronald Pringle, moved his young family to Los Angeles, California where I grew up. He would show me old (WW2) pictures of my uncle (James) in the Pringle crypt at the Melrose Abbey. I moved back to British Columbia for my university education and subsequent career as a geologist and ended up in Toronto, Ontario. That photo of my uncle fascinated me, and I went on to visit Scotland for my 30th, 40th, 50th and 60th birthdays.

As a Trustee I hope to reach out and get more Canadian Pringles interested in the organization. I signed up for the DNA project and was tested but I need to dig deeper into the whole project (and genetics) now that I have more time on my hands. I am also interested in history of Pringles in terms of their role in the slave trade in the Americas, as well as their role in the abolitionist movement.

Adam Pringle—Ireland



Greetings from Ireland! I am honoured to have been elected as Irish Representative on Clan Pringle's Board of Trustees at June's AGM. I have been involved in genealogy work for a few years now and through researching the Pringle surname I came across Clan Pringle but at the time I couldn't link my family to anything on the website. I was later officially introduced to Clan Pringle by my late friend and cousin Russell Pringle of Chehalis, Washington in the United States. He added me to our North American group on Facebook and I was fascinated by all the different Pringle's everywhere! It made me really want to find where our family fits in. Russ also sent, in the post, a gift of a Clan Pringle mug, which sits on my desk and will come with me wherever I go in the future. His greatest gift to me though was his friendship. Our conversations usually centred on the vast amount of Pringle research he had gathered in the previous decades - he had been in contact with my grandfather Hammie (Hamilton) the year I was born! It meant that he could help me with details I hadn't figured out and then I helped him figuring out the family back home in Ireland. In the few years since, I have been in contact with hundreds of people, finding cousins in the US, UK, Canada, Australia, Italy, France, and even China. Helping people piece together their families has given me a newfound sense of purpose and confidence that I didn't expect at all when I started vaguely looking into my family history in the summer of 2019.

I feel I am entering the Clan Pringle Association at an interesting and exciting time. There are lots of possibilities, and looking ahead to the planned Pringle Gathering in Scotland in 2025, I hope to introduce many of the Pringle cousins I have met online over the years to Clan Pringle, and also find others. I'm also hopeful that the Pringle DNA projects will help me figure out where my family fits into the Clan, with a connection to the Pringle's of Ballinahone, Co. Monaghan currently most likely. As the International Day of Friendship approaches, I remember Russ, and hope to help other Pringle's further their research and understand just how big their family actually is, as he helped me with mine.

Dr John Adams Pringle 1910 – 2002 A Scholar, Scientist and Author

(Part I of this article was presented in April 2023 issue.)

Dad became interested in wild life at an early age. An uneducated farm worker, Mauf, showed him a Cape Cobra. The stories that Mauf told him enthralled him. He gained firsthand knowledge of animals, birds, plants etc.

Mom and Dad got married on 7 October 1939 and were happily married for44 years. Mom died on 12 October 1983. They spent one night on their honeymoon at Melrose Farm near Bedford, where Oubaas spent his youth.

My sister Margaret was born in Port Elizabeth on 20 March1941. I was also born in Port Elizabeth, on 9 October 1943.

Dad began collecting data for the book "Pringles of the Valleys" that he co-authored with Mark and Eric Pringle. He became interested in the history of the Scottish Party of the 1820 Settlers. A meeting was held at Eildon, where the Scottish Party settled. The farm is still owned by Alex Pringle, a descendant of William Pringle. It was decided to erect a memorial church on the farm.

In 1970 the remains of the leader of the Scottish Party, Thomas Pringle, were exhumed from Bunhill Fields in London and were reburied in the church in October 1970. This was to coincide with the 150th anniversary of the 1820 Settlers.



In 1940 Dad began collecting snake em-

bryos as materials for his PhD thesis. He didn't have a computer. An antiquated microscope with an old camera lens was used to make most of the drawings. The manuscript was accepted by the University of the Witwatersrand in 1954.

In 1953 the family moved to Pietermaritzburg when Dad was appointed Director of the Natal Museum. There he became a Rotarian and later was President of the local club.

Dad was very interested in nature and became president of the Wildlife Society of South Africa. He retired in 1975 and spent 7 years writing the history of wild life conservation in South Africa. The coffee table book is called "The Conservationists and the Killers."

When he became Director of the Natal Museum in 1953, Dad realised that the museum had inadequate space for a modern museum. He applied for, and got, a Carnegie Grant to visit the USA in 1957 to study American Museums. Plans for a large new addition, including exhibition space, a lecture hall, a library and rooms for scientists were finally approved. The new building was opened in 1968.
