

Dear Friends:

A link was provided asking people to indicate if they would consider attending. To date only seventeen responses have been received. FamilySearch tells us there are about 42,000 people around the world with the last name Pringle. 


Happy Hogmandy

Scottish Events in New Zealand

November 11 2023, the Hororata Highland Games were held at Hororata, a rural town about 50 min. drive west of Christchurch. A crowd of several thousand supported this day by watching events and visiting displays which included the clan information sites. My wife Melva and our son Rodger represented Clan Pringle. The recently completed Pringle Clan Banner joined with those of 15 other clans in the parade.

November 19 members of many clans joined the congregation of The Village Presbyterian Church in Christchurch for The Kirkin of the Tartan service. Many folk also enjoyed the Scottish hospitality at a local pub, the "Rose and Thistle ", which offered Scottish music, food and a wee dram. November 30 this included the address to the haggis on St Andrews Day.



January 1 2024 The 152nd Waipu Highland Games were held (2 hours north of Auckland). My plans were to carry the banner in the parade and to meet more Pringles. Unfortunately, covid forced me into isolation. Waipu has a rich Scottish history based on the "pilgrimage" of a church minister and his flock leaving northeast USA and settling in Waipu in the mid 1800's after a sojourn in Australia. Pringles in Canada

19th Century Pringle Immigrants to Ontario

Whitby Ontario, an unassuming bedroom community 50 km east of Toronto (Canada's largest city), is home to Pringle place names, most notably Pringle Creek and the Pringle neighbourhood located generally east of the historic downtown. There is also a Pringle Creek Park, Pringle Playground, Pringle Public School, and a Pringle Drive. I've driven past a number of these places over the past 30 years and was always curious as to the origin of these place names. Setting out on a walking visit to Whitby and a shallow dive into the Internet my preliminary research into the Pringles of Ontario led me here.

An early trace of Pringles in Whitby goes back to a James "Jas" Pringle (b. 1824 in Edinburgh) who at eleven years old came to nearby Coburg and then to Whitby in 1836 when he was eleven. Information on his father John Sr., according to the Find a Grave website, suggests John Sr.'s mum, Agnes, was interred in the Melrose Abbey (Scotland) cemetery in 1839. John Sr. (b. 1788) had at least four sons and two daughters which he brought to Canada. Two of



the siblings eventually migrated to the Bruce Peninsula (nestled between Lake Huron and Georgian Bay) while Alexander, Margret, Agnes and James ended up in Whitby. Jas grew up to be a hotel proprietor for both the National Hotel down at Port Whitby and the Royal Hotel in the centre of Whitby.

I walked about 2 km from the train station to the centre of Whitby and another 1 km to find Pringle Creek east of downtown. I stumbled upon the Royal Hotel which still exists and is operating. Designed by Toronto architect Henry Langley the hotel was constructed in 1873 and subsequently operated by Jas.

In the Royal Hotel, Canada's first Prime Minister, as Leader of the Opposition, delivered a speech on May 2, 1877 in support of the local Conservative candidate Thomas N. Gibbs of Oshawa. The Royal Hotel, operated by James Pringle, was built in 1872/73. replacing an earlier Royal Hotel that burned down.

A historical marker (of national significance and listing James Pringle) is attached to the façade. John A. MacDonald, the first prime minister of Canada, was a guest at the hotel and delivered a speech in support of a local candidate. This was in 1877.

Continuing with my walk I found a view of Pringle Creek from a bridge which presented a small wetland and a humble meandering stream draining the Pringle neighborhood.

Jas appears to have had seven children including twin daughters, Mary and Harriet. The twins remained in Whitby, married, and Harriet was honored as the Queen of Whitby when she was 92 years old. Find a Grave

identifies her as being interred in a nearby Oshawa cemetery, but no mention is made of where Mary is buried. The cemeteries of Whitby and Oshawa indicate twenty-six Pringle burials most of them with birthdates in the 1800's.
