Dear Pringles and Friends,

We hope you are well and looking forward to the opportunities of the new year. The Clan Pringle Association's Board of Trustees met via Zoom on January 17. We share with you here a few of the items of interest discussed.

Due to health problems Priscilla, our treasurer, and Sir Murray, were unable to join us. Those present took some time to reconnect with each other as we had not met since last June. By way of follow-up to the International Pringle Gathering in Scotland last June we addressed two issues; It was decided to send a letter on behalf of the Board to Laird James of Torwoodlee to express sincere appreciation for his hospitality in hosting the International Gathering. His warm Scottish welcome and his work in the necessary arrangements are appreciated by all who attended. Regarding expenses of the Gathering event, 2,619 sterling was paid from the CPA funds, which are generated from our annual CPA membership fees. The cost of producing the membership certificates has not been paid for yet – Adam to follow-up on this item.

We took time to discuss future planning possibilities. Garry informed us that the North American Steering Committee meets next month to consider plans for the bi-annual Pringle Gathering next Fall. As the NA Steering Committee has been active and quite successful since 2016, we discussed the possibility of establishing Steering Committees, as defined in the CPA constitution, in other countries. Rob asks for email contacts in South Africa, and Dave asks for contacts in New Zealand and Australia, so that they might work to this end. Adam already has a contact group in Ireland and would like more. Andrew and James M. are considering the possibility of a UK Steering Committee.

As we reflected together, the Trustees felt that we have come a long way since our founding in 2012. Yet there are still many Pringles in various countries that we are not yet in contact with. We want to encourage all to reach out to other Pringles in your area. Share with them about Clan Pringle. If you forward us their email contact we'll gladly include them in the Newsletter mailing.

Irish Pringle Y-DNA Theory Update

Although I hoped it would align with our Clan Gathering in June, it was in August 2025 that I finally realised a long-held ambition to find out my Y-DNA haplogroup and possibly decipher where my family originated. I had previously thought we linked into the Ballinahone, Monaghan family, but wondered why they didn't link to any of our test results. I got a shock when the haplogroup was confirmed as R-FTA91789, which actually matched Jean-Jacques Pringels' family in Belgium amongst others.



Old family notes had suggested our family came to Cavan via Armagh, so I thought we must link to another family in the Armagh/Tyrone/Monaghan area in the early 1600s. Jean-Jacques provided a theory from his uncle's research that suggested a Robert Pringle who moved from Stow, Scotland to Tandragee, Armagh in the 1670s. I thought it a bit late to be correct, but after researching, the theory lines up remarkably well, and actually may show our links to other families too. It's important to note this is a **THEORY**, we would like to prove it.

I know my family line back to about the 1780s in the Cavan/Meath area. There are notes of other tenant farming families moving down from Armagh to here in the 1750s and 60s, and I think it's likely that is when we moved. I calculated about three generations of unknown Pringle men between 1670s-1750s in my line, with one born in the 1660s/70s possibly moving from Stow with his theoretical father Robert (1633-c.1684). Jean-Jacques may be descended from another son of Robert's who moved to Belgium as a merchant in the 1690s. This link matches with the timeframe for our Most Recent Common Ancestor (MRCA).

Robert of Stow/Tandragee was reportedly son of James of Stow (1602-1638), who is also believed to be father of William Prindle (1628-1690), later of New Haven, Connecticut fame. This makes sense as I matched some of his descendants also, some of whom I met in Scotland! James of Stow was son of Andrew of Whytbank/Stow (1567-1604), himself then supposedly a son of James, 2nd Laird of Whytbank (1539-1592).

Andrew's brother James Pringle (1570-1616) is known to be the ancestor of the South African Pringles, such as the poet Thomas Pringle. Amazingly, sharing my exact haplogroup is a Pringle in New Zealand who descends from the South African family, meaning we are the same branch, despite this MRCA being from the 1570s in Scotland.

Tracing the Whytbank line back brings you to David, 6th Laird of Smailholm (1470-1535), who was a brother of William, 1st Laird of Torwoodlee (1475-1513). A common theory for the Ballinahone, Monaghan branch is that they may descend from William of Colligarie, Tyrone, son of the 3rd Laird of Torwoodlee. My haplogroup supposedly split off as a branch around the 1400s according to FTDNA. The Ballinahone branch has a different haplogroup, could it be that this was where they split, in the 1470s? Is our haplogroup that of the Whytbank Pringles?

Did you know that the Bible tells us about "clans"?

What comes to your mind when you hear the word clan? We know that there are clans in many cultures and countries. No doubt, we Pringles will automatically think of historic ancient Scottish and Irish systems, traditions of group identity and ancestry which today because of emigration finds itself represented in various countries around the world.

However, centuries before clan formation in Scotland we learn of the place of clans in the ancient Hebrew world. The Bible speaks of clans in the Old Testament many times. So let's look at a few examples of this. First, let's clarify one important matter. In America when people hear the word clan, they may think of the racist term beginning with the capital letter "K". That is not who we are of course. The term clan in the Old Testament defines lineage and heritage and the group's placement within society.

A good example is found in the Book of Joshua (7, 14). "In the morning therefore, you shall come forward tribe by tribe. The tribe that the Lord takes shall come near by clans, the clan that the Lord takes shall come near by household . . ." Here we find that in the societal structure clans are arranged between tribe and household/family. The tribe is the wider community while the house/family is the individual family unit. The term clan is linked to a person, a name. Later in this chapter (16-17) we find these descriptions; "So Joshua rose early in the morning and brought Israel near tribe by tribe, and the tribe of Judah was taken. He brought near the clans of Judah, and the clan of Zerahites was taken, and he brought near the clan of Zerahites, family by family . . ."

Another good example is found in 1 Chronicles 1, 51-54. "The clans of Edom were: clans Timna, Aliah, Jetheth, Oholibamah, Elah, Pinon, Kenaz, Teman, Mibzar, Magdiel, and Iram: these are the clans of Edom." (See also Genesis 36:15:43)

So the Scottish clan arrangement was not a new concept in the ordering of society. It's focus on family relationships and ancestry is an ancient system. For many of us it plays a valuable role in our personal identity, and explains why we have certain traditions, customs, and habits.

Maybe now, having raised this subject, we might encourage folk to further explore and research the history of clans in the Old Testament going back three to four thousand years.


